

Primary PE and Sport Premium Report for 2014/15

The Primary PE and Sport Premium was launched by the government in April 2013 and is available for three years to July 2016. It is ring-fenced funding to be used by the school to improve the quality and breadth of our PE, sport and physical activity provision.

The national vision is for: *“All pupils leaving primary school [to be] physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.”*

In 2014/15, we received approximately £9250. The details below show how we spent the Premium and what impact it had on our pupils.

There is increased continuity between taught lessons and competitions due to Miss Hewison's knowledge of the children and ability to organise and lead squads. A wider variety of activities is accessed by the pupils, for example, handball and orienteering.

Coaches for after school clubs Wheelchair basketball (In the final term) was used as an alternative sport to encourage less active children to attend.	£2750		All KS1 & KS2 children have participated in planned intra-school competitions, competing for the house cup every half term. The profile of PE and Sport has been raised across the whole school. Progress has been made towards achieving the YST Silver Award, after successfully gaining the Bronze Award last year. We have continued to have a high percentage of children attending after school sports clubs. These have included gymnastics, street dance, football, multi-skills, tag rugby, basketball, netball and hoola hooping. 76% of KS2 children have attended at least 1 after school club and 42% have attended at least 2 different clubs. 12 children have attended clubs who have never been to a club in the past. Out of 15 children, 9 who attended the wheelchair basketball club had not attended any other club this year.
The impact on pupils' engagement in healthy, active lifestyles			
A Sports Playground Leader has worked on the KS2 playground offering planned lunchtime activities and has trained 4 young leaders to assist dinner staff.	Within TA costs	KS2	Planned lunchtime activities have improved behaviour on the playground. Children are more active at lunchtime and staff have reported that the children generally return to the classroom calmer and are more ready to learn. The young leaders show greater confidence and have increased communication and leadership skills.
As a result of the above, the impact on pupils' engagement and achievement in school as a whole			
Attitudes: engaging more pupils in inter-school and regular intra-school competition, and recognising a wider range of achievements in school assemblies and on the school noticeboard, has increased many pupils' motivation in school generally as they feel more valued and proud of their success.			
Behaviours: Having a dedicated sports leader on the playground has led to improved behaviour at lunch times and consequently the children are more ready for learning in the afternoon.
