E.g. Question 1: 15 cm + 50 mm = OR 15 cm + 5 cm = 20 cm</p>
<p>Writing This week I'd like you to have a go at making a leaflet or pamphlet that could be given to other children entitled: <i>A Kid's Guide to Surviving Lockdown</i>.</p> <p>You will need to write this in the style of a non-chronological report, so think back to when we wrote about The Riverside Stadium. It needs to be colourful and include pictures. 😊</p>	
<p>Science <u>What is the most reflective material in your house?</u> Continuing the theme of materials, this week set up an experiment to test materials that are reflective. This means you can see your reflection off its surface.</p> <p>Think about how you will record your results (e.g. table, chart) and write a short analysis of your findings. Try to explain why you think some surfaces may be more reflective than others.</p>	<p>Think about how you can make this a fair test e.g. looking at items in the same location or in the same amount of light.</p>
<p>Art</p>  <p>In our very first lesson about Hockney, we talked about the subjects of his paintings.</p> <p>Here, Hockney has painted his mother and father – you can even see he has added his own reflection in the mirror.</p> <p>Have a go at drawing or painting a relative in the same way.</p>	<p>You could take a photograph of your relative to refer back to, or use a printed photograph you already have.</p>

William Shakespeare




William Shakespeare's Family

William Shakespeare is thought to have been born on 23rd April, 1564 in Stratford-upon-Avon, England. William was the third child of John and Mary Shakespeare.

Fascinating Facts

- At the age of 18, William married Anne Hathaway.
- They had a daughter called Susanna in 1583.
- Two years later, Anne gave birth to twins - a boy called Hamnet and a girl called Judith. Hamnet died when he was 11 years old.
- William moved to London where he earned money as an actor and a playwright.



Shakespeare's Plays

Shakespeare wrote plays which were tragedies (very sad plays) and comedies, which were funny. He wrote the plays about things people had experienced: jealousy, anger, love, romance, religion and war.

Some of his most famous plays have been turned into cartoons and films. For example, Romeo and Juliet was made into a film, and later a cartoon about two garden gnomes!
